Dear Dr. Dupre:

The U.S. Department of Education (Department), Office for Civil Rights (OCR), Dallas Office, has completed processing of the above-referenced complaint, which was received in our office on March 22, 2017, and filed against the Fort Bend Independent School District (FBISD or District), in Sugar Land, Texas. The Complainant alleged that the FBISD discriminated against XXXX XXXX (Student) on the basis of disability (XXXX XXXX XXXX).

OCR is responsible for determining whether entities that receive or benefit from Federal financial assistance from the Department, or an agency that has delegated investigative authority to this Department, are in compliance with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (Section 504), 29 U.S.C. § 794 (amended 1992), and its implementing regulations at 34 C.F.R. Part 104. Section 504 prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability. OCR also enforces Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (Title II), 42 U.S.C. §§ 12131 *et seq.*, and its implementing regulations at 28 C.F.R. Part 35. Under Title II, OCR has jurisdiction over complaints alleging discrimination on the basis of disability that are filed against public entities. The FBISD is a recipient of Federal financial assistance from the Department and is a public entity. Therefore, OCR has personal jurisdictional authority to process this complaint for resolution.

OCR opened the allegation for investigation, and investigated the following issue:

Whether the FBISD discriminated against the Student on the basis of XXXX disability during the XXXX school year by failing to provide the Student with an equal opportunity to participate in nonacademic services (i.e. Extend Day Program) in violation of Section 504 and its implementing regulations at 34 C.F.R § 104.37(a) and Title II and its implementing regulations at 28 C.F.R. § 35.130(a).

Prior to OCR issuing a final investigative determination, the FBISD requested to resolve the

complaint by voluntarily entering into a Resolution Agreement (Agreement). Under OCR's procedures, a complaint may be resolved at any time when, prior to the point that the OCR Regional Office issues a final determination under Section 303 of OCR's Case Processing Manual, the recipient expresses an interest in resolving the allegations and OCR determines that it is appropriate to resolve them with an agreement.

On May 7, 2019, the FBISD voluntarily entered into the enclosed Agreement, which, when fully implemented, resolves the complaint. The Agreement is aligned with the complaint allegations and the information obtained during the investigation, and is consistent with applicable law and regulations. Specifically, the Agreement requires the FBISD to implement policies and procedures for the provision of accommodations to students participating in the Extended Day Program (EDP), provide a training to FBISD staff members at Cornerstone Elementary regarding the FBISD's obligation under Section 504 and Title II to provide students an equal opportunity to participate in nonacademic services, and assess the Student's needs with respect to admission into and participation in the EDP. Accordingly, as of the date of this letter, OCR will cease all investigative actions regarding this complaint. However, OCR will actively monitor the FBISD implementation of the Agreement to ensure compliance with Section 504 and Title II with regard to the issue investigated.

This concludes OCR's investigation of the complaint and should not be interpreted to address the District's compliance with any other regulatory provision or to address any issues other than those addressed in this letter. This letter sets forth OCR's determination in an individual OCR case. This letter is not a formal statement of OCR policy and should not be relied upon, cited, or construed as such. OCR's formal policy statements are approved by a duly authorized OCR official and made available to the public. Please also note that the Complainant may have the right to file a private suit in federal court whether or not OCR finds a violation.

Please be advised that a recipient may not harass, coerce, intimidate, or discriminate against any individual because he or she has filed a complaint or participated in the complaint resolution process. If this happens, complainants may file another complaint alleging such treatment.

Under the Freedom of Information Act, it may be necessary to release this document and related correspondence and records upon request. In the event that OCR receives such a request, it will seek to protect, to the extent provided by law, personally identifiable information which, if released, could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy.
