# RESOLUTION AGREEMENT Fauquier County Public Schools OCR Case No. 11-16-1832

The U.S. Department of Education, Office for Civil Rights (OCR), initiated an investigation into allegations that Fauquier County Public Schools (the Division) violated Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and its implementing regulation at 34 C.F.R. Part 104, and Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 and its implementing regulation at 28 C.F.R. Part 35. Specifically, the complainant alleged that the Division's website contained barriers to access for people with disabilities, thereby denying them an equal opportunity to participate in the Division's programs, services, and activities and denying them effective communication necessary for full participation in the Division's programs, services, and activities.

To ensure compliance with Section 504 and Title II and their implementing regulations and to resolve the issues of this investigation, the Division voluntarily agrees to take the actions set forth below, regarding its programs and activities offered through the Division's website, information put on other websites by the Division such as social media, or any entity the Division has a contractual relationship with and/or provides significant assistance to.

<u>Assurances of Nondiscrimination</u>. The Division hereby reaffirms its commitment to ensure that people with disabilities have an opportunity equal to that of their nondisabled peers to participate in the Division's programs, benefits, and services, including those delivered through electronic and information technology, except where doing so would impose an undue burden or create a fundamental alteration.

<u>Benchmarks for Measuring Accessibility</u>. For the purposes of this Agreement, the accessibility of online content and functionality will be measured according to the W3C's Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG) 2.0 Level AA and the Web Accessibility Initiative Accessible Rich Internet Applications Suite (WAI-ARIA) 1.0 techniques for web content, which are incorporated by reference.

Adherence to these accessible technology standards is one way to ensure compliance with the Division's underlying legal obligations to ensure people with disabilities are able to acquire the same information, engage in the same interactions, and enjoy the same benefits and services within the same timeframe as their nondisabled peers, with substantially equivalent ease of use; that they are not excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or otherwise subjected to discrimination in any Division programs, services, and activities delivered online, as required by Section 504 and Title II and their implementing regulations; and that they receive effective communication of the Division's programs, services, and activities delivered online. With advanced, written approval of OCR, the Division may propose and use other industry-accepted guidelines and benchmarks to measure accessibility.

### Remedies and Reporting

1) <u>Proposed Procedures Regarding New Online Content and Functionality</u>. By June 1, 2017, the Division will submit to OCR for its review and approval proposed procedures ("the

Plan for New Content") to ensure that all new, newly-added, or modified online content and functionality will be accessible to people with disabilities as measured by conformance to the Benchmarks for Measuring Accessibility set forth above, except where doing so would impose a fundamental alteration or undue burden.

- a) When fundamental alteration or undue burden defenses apply, the Plan for New Content will ensure that the Division provides equally effective alternative access; in such instances, the Division must take any actions that do not result in a fundamental alteration or undue financial and administrative burdens, but nevertheless ensure that, to the maximum extent possible, individuals with disabilities receive the same benefits or services as their nondisabled peers. To provide equally effective alternate access, alternatives are not required to produce the identical result or level of achievement for persons with and without disabilities, but must afford persons with disabilities equal opportunity to obtain the same result, to gain the same benefit, or to reach the same level of achievement, in the most integrated setting appropriate to the person's needs.
- b) The Plan for New Content must include sufficient quality assurance procedures, backed by adequate personnel and financial resources, for full implementation. This provision also applies to the Division's online content and functionality developed by, maintained by, or offered through a third-party vendor or by using open sources. The Division will use its best efforts to ensure that third-party vendors and open sources adhere to the benchmarks for measuring accessibility referenced above, and will notify such vendors and open sources in instances when the Division learns that any information provided by them is inaccessible and ask that the information be made accessible. The Division will resolve any disputes with such vendors or open sources in a manner which complies with the Division's nondiscrimination obligations under Section 504 and Title II.
- c) Within sixty (60) days of receiving OCR's approval of the Plan for New Content, the Division will officially adopt and fully implement the amended procedures.
- d) Reporting: Within ninety (90) days of receiving OCR's approval, the Division will submit to OCR the approved procedures, evidence of their adoption and distribution, and a description of how they are being implemented.
- 2) <u>Undue Burden and Fundamental Alteration</u>. For any technology-related requirement in this Agreement for which the Division asserts an undue burden or fundamental alteration defense, such assertion may only be made by the Superintendent or by an individual designated by the Superintendent who has budgetary authority after considering all resources available for use in the funding and operation of the service, program, or activity, and must be accompanied by a written statement of the reasons for reaching that conclusion, including the cost of meeting the requirement and the available funding and other resources. The written statement will be certified by the determining official. If such a determination is made, the certifying official will describe in the written statement how it will provide equally effective alternate access, *i.e.*, other action that would not result in such an alteration or such burdens but would nevertheless ensure that, to the

- maximum extent possible, individuals with disabilities receive the same benefits or services provided by the Division as their nondisabled peers.
- 3) Evaluation of Existing Content and Functionality. The Division will propose for OCR's review and approval the identity and bona fides of an Evaluator (corporation or individual, internal or external to the Division) to evaluate all content and functionality on its website, including, but not limited to, the home page, all subordinate pages, and intranet pages and sites, to identify any online content or functionality that is inaccessible to persons with disabilities, including online content and functionality developed by, maintained by, or offered through a third party vendor or an open source. The Evaluator will have sufficient knowledge and experience in website accessibility for people with disabilities to carry out all related tasks, including developing a proposed Corrective Action Plan. The Evaluator will use the Benchmarks for Measuring Accessibility set out above, unless the Division receives prior permission from OCR to use a different standard as a benchmark. During the Evaluation, the Division will also seek input from members of the public with disabilities, including parents, students, employees, and others associated with the Division, and other persons knowledgeable about website accessibility, regarding the accessibility of its online content and functionality.

### Reporting:

- a) By June 1, 2017, the Division will submit the *bona fides* of its proposed Evaluator to OCR for review and approval. OCR will evaluate whether the proposed Evaluator has the requisite experience and knowledge to carry out an appropriate Evaluation and to develop a proposed Corrective Action Plan.
- b) Within ten (10) days of receiving OCR's approval of the proposed Evaluator, the Division will direct the Evaluator to begin its Evaluation and to complete and deliver to the Division a written Evaluation report within ninety (90) days of receiving such direction from the Division. The Division shall submit to OCR documentation of the steps taken by the Evaluator during the Evaluation, a description of the outreach it undertook and the input it received, and a detailed accounting of the results of the Evaluation within thirty (30) days of receiving the Evaluation report from the Evaluator.
- 4) Proposed Corrective Action Plan. Within ninety (90) days of the submission of the documentation referenced in paragraph (3)(b), above, the Division will submit to OCR for its review and approval a proposed Corrective Action Plan to address all inaccessible content and functionality identified during the Division's Evaluation. The proposed Corrective Action Plan will set out a detailed schedule for: (1) addressing problems, taking into account identified priorities, with all corrective actions to be completed within eighteen (18) months of the date OCR approved the Corrective Action Plan; (2) setting up systems of accountability and verifying claims of accessibility by vendors or open sources; and setting up a system of testing and accountability to maintain the accessibility of all online content and functionality on an ongoing basis. In its Corrective Action Plan, the Division will acknowledge that if all inaccessible content and functionality identified during the Evaluation is not removed or made accessible on a timely basis, the Division will be in violation of this Agreement, may be in

violation of Section 504 and Title II, and OCR may initiate administrative enforcement or judicial proceedings to enforce the specific terms and obligations of the Agreement.

Within 30 days of receiving OCR's approval of the proposed Corrective Action Plan, the Division will officially adopt and implement the Corrective Action Plan.

## Reporting:

- a) Within forty-five (45) days of receiving OCR's approval of the proposed Corrective Action Plan, the Division will submit to OCR the approved Corrective Action Plan, and documentation establishing that the approved Corrective Action Plan is being implemented according to the approved schedule. Reports will be due every six months thereafter until the Corrective Action Plan has been completed.
- 5) <u>Notice</u>. Within fifteen (15) days of the date of this Agreement, the Division will prominently post on its home page notice that its website is in the process of being updated to ensure compliance with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act and Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act and that in the interim website accessibility concerns may be brought to the attention of the webmasters at accessibility@fcps1.org.

Within thirty (30) days of the date of this Agreement, the Division will submit to OCR for review and approval a proposed Notice to persons with disabilities regarding how to request the webmaster or other appropriate person to provide access to (or notify the Division regarding) online information or functionality that is currently inaccessible. The proposed Notice will also include information or an accessible link to information instructing people how to file formal grievances under Section 504 and Title II. Within ten (10) days of receiving OCR's approval of the proposed Notice, the Division will officially adopt and prominently post the approved Notice on its home page and throughout its website (including all subordinate pages and intranet sites).

#### Reporting:

- a) Within ten (10) days of posting notice on its home page that the website is being updated to ensure compliance with Section 504 and Title II, the Division will provide verification of the posting.
- b) Within fifteen (15) days of receiving OCR's approval of the Division's proposed Notice, the Division will provide documentation to OCR regarding the locations and content of its published Notice.
- 6) <u>Training</u>. Starting no later than thirty (30) days from this date of this Agreement, and annually thereafter, the Division will deliver website accessibility training to all appropriate personnel, including, but not limited to: content developers, webmasters, procurement officials, and all others responsible for developing, loading, maintaining, or auditing web content and functionality.

### Reporting:

a) On a quarterly basis, until such time as OCR closes the monitoring of this Agreement, the Division will submit to OCR documentation that training has been delivered. The documentation will include a list of invitees and attendees, including titles; a description of the delivered training content; and the presenters' credentials for giving such training.

The Division understands that OCR will not close the monitoring of this Agreement until OCR determines that the Division has fulfilled the terms of this Agreement and is in compliance with the regulations implementing Section 504 and Title II, at 34 C.F.R. Part 104 and 28 C.F.R. Part 35.

The Division understands that by signing this Agreement, it agrees to provide data and other information in a timely manner. Further, the Division understands that during the monitoring of this Agreement, OCR may visit the Division, interview staff and students, and request such additional reports or data as are necessary for OCR to determine whether the Division has fulfilled the terms of this Agreement and is in compliance with the regulations implementing Section 504 and Title II, at 34 C.F.R. Part 104 and 28 C.F.R. Part 35, which were at issue in this case.

The Division understands and acknowledges that OCR may initiate administrative enforcement or judicial proceedings to enforce the specific terms and obligations of this Agreement. Before initiating administrative enforcement (34 C.F.R. §§ 100.9, 100.10) or judicial proceedings to enforce this Agreement, OCR shall give the Division written notice of the alleged breach and sixty (60) calendar days to cure the alleged breach.
