Dear Chairman Kohl:

The Office for Civil Rights of the Department of Education (OCR/ED) recently requested additional information regarding the Yeshiva Torah Vodaath and Mesivta's (Yeshiva), formerly the Mesivta Talmudical Seminary, request for a religious exemption from Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972.

In his response, which supplements the original exemption request submitted by Rabbi G. Schorr, Rabbi Aaron Braun describes certain policies practiced at the Yeshiva as consistent with the tenets of the religious organization that controls the institution. These policies would violate certain sections of the regulation implementing Title IX (copy enclosed) absent a religious exemption. The Yeshiva has supplied information that establishes that the institution is controlled by a religious organization and that practices based on tenets followed by this organization conflict with specific sections of the Title IX regulation. Therefore, I am granting the Yeshiva an exemption to those sections of the Title IX regulation specified in Rabbi Braun's August 29, 1985, letter. The exemption is limited to the extent that compliance with the Title IX regulation conflicts with the religious tenets followed by the institution. The Yeshiva Torah Vodaath and Mesivta is hereby exempted from the requirements of the following sections of the Title IX regulation: 34 C.F.R. §§ 106.21, 106.22, 106.23, 106.51, 106.52, 106.53, 106.55, and 106.59. The basis for our decision to grant this exemption is discussed in further detail below.

Rabbi Schorr stated in his original letter that the Yeshiva is "controlled, conducted and operated by the Orthodox Jewish religion." This relationship between Orthodox Judaism and the Yeshiva adequately establishes that the Yeshiva Torah Vodaath and Mesivta is controlled by a religious organization as is required for consideration for exemption under § 106.12 of the Title IX regulation.

In Rabbi Braun's letter, he stated that religious tenets "require us to admit only male students and to hire only male faculty." Based on these practices, the Yeshiva has requested and is granted by this letter exemption to: 34 C.F.R. § 106.21 (admission), § 106.22 (preference in admission), § 106.23 (recruitment of students), § 106.51 (employment), § 106.52 (employment criteria), § 106.53 (recruitment of employees), § 106.55 (job classification and structure), and § 106.59 (advertising).

This letter should not be construed to grant exemption from any section of the Title IX regulation not specifically mentioned. In the event that OCR receives a complaint against your institution, we are obligated to determine initially whether the allegations fall within the exemption herein granted. Also, in the unlikely event that a complainant alleges that the practices followed by the institution are not based on the religious tenets of the controlling organization, OCR is obligated to contact the controlling organization to verify those tenets. If the organization provides an interpretation of tenets that has a different practical impact than that described by the institution, or if the organization denies that it controls the institution, this exemption will be rescinded.
