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STATE TRIBAL EDUCATION PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

Purpose of the Program:

Provide grants to tribal education agencies (TEAs) to increase their role in the education of American Indian/Alaska Native (AI/AN) children

Student Performance Teaching and Leading

- 1. Adopting and Implementing Native Language and Culture Standards Aligned to a State's College- and Career-Ready Academic Standards
- A. Develop standards for native language and culture

- 2. Using Student Performance to Improve Outcomes

3. Effective Teaching and Leading

6. Promoting Cultural Competence Among Native Culture

7. Effective Federal Grant Program Administration

- A. Monitor districts for requirements of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act
- B. Develop a school-year budget including Federal, State and local funds
