### PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Howard University (University) was federally chartered in 1867 as a private, nonprofit educational institution in Washington, DC. As a comprehensive, research-oriented historically Black university, the University's mission is to provide an educational experience of exceptional quality at the undergraduate, graduate, and professional levels. The University has an enduring commitment to the education and advancement of underserved populations in America and the global community, and it ranks among the highest producers of the Nation's Black professionals in medicine, dentistry, pharmacy, engineering, nursing, architecture, religion, law, music, social work, and education. The National Science Foundation consistently ranks the University among the highest producers of Black Ph.D. students. According to data from the Association of American Medical Colleges, the University is the Nation's most prolific source of Black graduates who go on to apply to medical school.

The University offers more than 120 fields of study leading to undergraduate, graduate, and professional degrees within 13 schools and colleges: Arts and Sciences, Business, Communications, Dentistry, Divinity, Education, Engineering and Architecture, Graduate School, Law, Medicine, Nursing and Allied Health Sciences, Pharmacy, and Social Work. A wide range of administrative, library, computer, and technology resources and services support these programs. Together, these investments further the University's goals of expanding the opportunities of graduates, especially in fields in which they are still underserved.

**Howard University Hospital** — Established in 1862 as Freedmen's Hospital, Howard University Hospital (Hospital) was incorporated into the University by Congress in 1962. Today, the Hospital is a general medical and surgical facility and is designated as a Level 1 Trauma Center. The 241-bed hospital is one of several comprehensive health care facilities serving the Washington, DC metropolitan area, with over 11,000 admissions and 60,000 emergency room

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visits annually. Hospital operations are financed through a combination of Federal funds, hospitalization insurance, patient payments, Medicare and Medicaid payments, and contractual agreements for patient care services with the District of Columbia government and other local jurisdictions. The Hospital is also a major teaching facility, providing training opportunities across a wide variety of specialty areas for graduate and professional students in the health sciences. Beginning in 2021, Howard University began construction of a new hospital and requested \$300 million in Federal funds to support the construction. Since fiscal year 2021, the University has received \$207 million for the project.

### **FY 2024 BUDGET REQUEST**

For fiscal year 2024, the Administration requests \$347.0 million for Howard University (the University). The Administration also proposes continuing to lift the restrictions in Title III, Part D, Section 344(a) of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended (U.S.C. 1066c(a)) that prevent Howard University from accessing the HBCU Capital Financing Program.<sup>1</sup> Howard University, similar to all other HBCUs, should have access to low-interest capital financing to address its capital needs. This request supports the Administration's goals to advance opportunities in higher education and strengthen the capacity of HBCUs to provide the highest quality education. As a congressionally chartered HBCU, the University plays an important role in providing underserved individuals, particularly Black and African American students, with access to a high-quality postsecondary education.

According to the University, the Federal appropriation constituted approximately 25 percent of the University's total revenues and 42 percent of the Howard University Hospital's (Hospital) total revenues in fiscal year 2023. In order to maintain current levels of educational and healthcare services, approximately \$226.7 million of the fiscal year 2024 appropriation would be allocated under General Support to the University, \$27.3 million would support the Hospital's current healthcare needs, and \$93.0 million would support construction of a new hospital – fully meeting the University's funding request for that project. General Support includes the University's academic programs, research programs, the endowment program, and construction.

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In addition, since March 2020, Howard University has received a total of \$68 million in direct supplemental funding to prevent, prepare for, and respond to coronavirus, domestically or internationally, including to help defray the expenses directly caused by coronavirus and to enable grants to students for expenses directly related to coronavirus and the disruption of university operations. More specifically, Howard University received \$13 million from the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (P.L. 116-136); \$20 million from Division M of the FY 2021 Consolidated Appropriations Act (P.L. 116-260); and \$35 million from the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (P.L. 117-02).

Academic Programs: The request would provide approximately \$2 million for public service programs, \$9 million for academic support, \$6 million for student services, and \$54 million for institutional support and grant aid to students.

Endowment Program: The 2024 request also would provide at least \$3.4 million for the University's endowment, and the University would be required to match this contribution on a dollar-for-dollar basis. The Administration believes continuing to earmark a minimum dollar level for the endowment encourages the University to increase its financial strength and independence from Federal support. The University maintains a pooled endowment that is comprised of hundreds of individual endowments that were valued at \$863 million as of June 30, 2022. Revenue earned through the consolidated endowment program is intended to be used for instructional and research support, professorships, scholarships and other forms of student aid, and facilities. In recent years, the University has matched all Federal funds appropriated for endowment purposes in the fiscal year in which they were appropriated, and it expects to do the same in fiscal year 2024.

Howard University's spending rate from its endowment is 4 percent of a spending pool based on market value, using a 3-year moving average with a 1-year lag. The University is currently reviewing its investment and spending policies going forward and looking for opportunities to increase the annual spending to continue its support of its mission critical goals.

Howard University Hospital: Federal support for the Hospital provides the University's students with education, research, and training opportunities in medical, dental, and other health-related fields. The Hospital remains the primary teaching hospital for more than 800 learners in the health care profession including medical students, nursing and allied health professionals, dentists, and pharmacists. Federal funding provides two types of support for the Howard University Hospital. The first is the annual appropriation for on-going expenses. The second is a one-time investment, provided over three years, to upgrade the Hospital's infrastructure. The current Hospital is over 50 years old. Between fiscal years 2021 and 2023, Congress appropriated a total of \$207 million toward the total cost of building a new hospital. More specifically, Congress appropriated \$7 million in fiscal year 2021 to begin work to modernize the Hospital's facilities; and \$100 million in each of fiscal years 2022 and 2023 to support hospital construction. In total, the University requested \$300 million in Federal funds to support this effort. The fiscal year 2024 request includes \$93 million to completely fulfill the University's request and ensure the Hospital's ability to meet current and future healthcare needs.

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The half-century old Hospital is an unacceptably outdated structure. Less than half of the beds at the facility can even be used. Howard and its consortium partners have come together to rebuild a new facility to continue as the academic medical center of the College of Medicine. A new facility would allow Howard to expand the size of its incoming medical school class and produce 2,000 new doctors in the first 10 years. A new facility would also allow similar increases at the dental, pharmacy, and nursing/allied health schools to better meet the acute need for diverse health care professionals nationwide. This robust pipeline of diverse health care professionals serving in historically underserved communities is even more critical now as COVID-19 has shown the dire consequences of our growing health care disparities.<sup>1</sup>

**Construction:** In fiscal year 2024, the University plans to spend \$50 million for construction. Appropriated funds may be allocated to capital (construction and renovation) projects which maintain and enhance the University's ability to provide high-quality postsecondary education and research environments.

**Additional Information:** The measure uses data taken from the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) database maintained by the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) rather than directly from the University.

The long-term goal is to increase Howard University's graduation rate. According to the IPEDS data, in 1998, the graduation rate for Howard University was only 41 percent, but by 2009, it had significantly increased to 69 percent. Since then, Howard's graduation rate has declined, and has hovered between 60-70 percent.

**Objective:** *Maintain or increase the retention of full-time undergraduate students.*

**Measure:** The percentage of first-time, full-time, degree-seeking, undergraduate students who were in their first year of postsecondary enrollment in the previous year and are enrolled in the current year.

**Additional Information:** Data from IPEDS showed the average persistence rate at Howard University's is 85 percent, except when it increased to 96 percent in 2018; and, most recently, the graduation rate is 95 percent.

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**Objective:** Increase student enrollment over the long term.

**Measure:** The number of full-time, degree-seeking, undergraduate and graduate students enrolled at Howard University.

**Additional Information:** The efficiency measure is calculated by dividing the total funds appropriated for Howard (exclusive of Hospital funding) by the number of students successfully completing degree or certificate programs. This measure allows the Department to track program performance in terms of cost to the Federal Government and the efficiency of Federal funds in achieving successful outcomes.

A similar efficiency measure has been established for the higher education programs authorized under Titles III and V of the Higher Education Act, as well as for Gallaudet University and the National Technical Institute for the Deaf. This metric may enable the Department to assess relative program performance across institutions with similar types of missions.
