Lunch in America	<p>The middle of the day is commonly set aside for lunch in America, a time when people take a break from their morning routine and eat a meal that will energize them for the afternoon. Some like to eat early lunches around eleven o'clock while others enjoy a late lunch usually from one to two o'clock in the afternoon. Lunch can last from 30 minutes to an hour and a half. These schedules may be dictated by the workplace or by the school. A sandwich, salad, and soup, or a meal with meat and a small serving of vegetables on the side can constitute a good lunchtime meal.</p> <p>Most schools have cafeterias designed especially for serving lunch to students. Here they select from a line of hot dishes, sandwiches, salads, beverages, and desserts. A server puts the food on the plate, which is carried on a tray to a table where the meal can be enjoyed with others. Some businesses have cafeterias too where employees can choose from a similar variety of foods.</p> <p>Cafeterias also provide a place for people to eat who bring their lunch from home. People often bring a lunch in a paper bag or lunch box to save money or just to enjoy food that they prefer. This lunch could be anything from a sandwich, chips and fruit to leftovers from the previous night's dinner. Often these cafeterias will have microwave ovens to re-heat leftovers and soups brought from home.</p> <p>Fast food restaurants are a popular lunchtime alternative. Famous for their burgers and sandwiches, many of these restaurants sell sodas, milkshakes, and salads as well as desserts to round off the meal. Fast food patrons order at the counter or order from their cars to take their lunch back to work or perhaps to a park to eat with co-workers or a friend. Most fast food restaurants have seating inside as well. The food is served in a paper wrapper or a disposable tray.</p> <p>At full service restaurants, another lunchtime option, customers are seated at a table and order their meals of beef, chicken or fish prepared with vegetables and bread from a menu. They may also have a choice of pasta dishes, a variety of sandwiches and large salads to choose from. These types of restaurants are popular with people who have a more leisurely schedule and prefer eating where the food is served to them at the table where they'll eat. Often these restaurants have a relaxing atmosphere and allow for quiet conversation among those at the table.</p>
American Grocery Stores	<p>Grocery stores in the United States come in an assortment of sizes and specialties to appeal to the budgets, shopping habits, and appetites of consumers. Some families make a weekly trip to the grocery store. Some people buy less frequently, buying quantities and sizes to last them a month or more at a time. There are also people who like to shop for specific brands or types of food. Many grocery stores try to appeal to these and other consumer preferences and habits.</p> <p>Superstores are large stores that provide their customers with a "one stop shopping" experience. Within this store, customers can buy not only the usual grocery items found in most stores, they can also shop for clothes, televisions, hardware, gardening supplies, home furnishings, and much more. Customers find superstores easier than going to several different stores to get what they need, saving them time, gas, and in many cases money.</p> <p>Shoppers who want to buy large amounts of goods can join stores called cost clubs. With their membership, these shoppers receive discounts on their purchases and find a varied selection of goods in bulk. This is suited to families and organizations that need to provide for a large number of people. Just like in the superstores, these shoppers can save money and time.</p>

Some groceries aren't unique because of their size, but because of what they sell. Health food stores are unique in that they appeal to health conscious shoppers like vegetarians or people who prefer to eat organically grown products. Many of the food products sold in these stores have natural ingredients and fewer preservatives. Their household products are environmentally friendly and are often made from recycled goods.
