Basic Educational Opportunity Grant Program End-of-Year Report – Academic Year 1974-75

Part I

Introduction

The Basic Educational Opportunity Grant (BEOG) Program is a new source of Federal student financial aid which provided funds for the first time in academic year 1973-74. This program provides for the payment of Basic Grant awards to students attending eligible institutions of postsecondary education. Basic Grant awards are intended to be the "floor" of an eligible student's financial aid to help defray the costs of postsecondary education. Student eligibility is primarily based on financial need determined on the basis of a formula developed by the Office of Education (OE) and reviewed annually by Congress. Under this program, a student would complete an application form providing certain income and asset information required to calculate his expected contribution or "eligibility index". This application form is submitted to an OE contractor who will calculate the eligibility index in accordance with the congressionally approved formula and notify the student of the results of this computation by means of a Student Eligibility Report (SER). The student in turn will submit the SER to the institution of his choice for payment of the grant award. The amount of the award is determined on the basis of a payment schedule which is issued annually by the Office of Education. As such, the program is essentially a formula program under which little discretion is permissible both in terms of establishing the students' eligibility and determination of his grant amount.

The Basic Grant appropriation for the 1973-74 academic year was \$122.1 million and eligibility was restricted to students who began their education after July 1, 1973 and who were enrolled on a full-time basis. Awards for 1973-74 ranged from \$50-\$452. During the second year of operation (1974-75), appropriations were \$475 million and award levels ranged from \$50-\$1,050. Eligibility was expanded to include a second class of students who began their postsecondary education after April 1, 1973 and who were enrolled on a full-time basis.

In order to improve the equity of the program and based on program experience during the 1973-74 academic year, the Office of Education proposed and Congress approved a number of changes to the Family Contribution Schedule for the 1974-75 academic year. These modifications to the Schedules were as follows:

a. <u>Asset treatment</u>—In those cases where the allowable deductions from income (Federal taxes, living expenses, unusual expenses, employment expenses) exceeded the family income, a deduction was made from the contribution from assets to offset this negative amount.

b. <u>Effective Income of the Student</u>—A Similar treatment was utilized for effective income of the student (social security and veterans educational benefits). In those cases were there was a negative discretionary income, a deduction was made from the effective income of the student offset this negative amount.

(**Note:** In those cases where there was negative discretionary income and an expected contribution from both assets and effective income of the student, the deduction was first taken from effective income of the student.)

- c. <u>Family Size Offset</u>—The social security low-income threshold base for determining the amount of the family size offset was used. These offsets were increased by the amount of the 1973 Consumer Price Index which is 8.8 percent.
- d. Other Assets—The category of "other assets" was eliminated from the Basic Grant system.

It should be noted that for the 1974-75 academic year, the Basic Grant appropriation language expanded student eligibility to include first, second, and third year undergraduate students who began or will begin their postsecondary education after April 1, 1973 and who are enrolled on a least a half-time basis.

The following end-of-year report represents a summary of applicant inforamtion as reported on the Basic Grant application form and various characteristics of those applicants.

Summary of 1974-75 Basic Grant Operations

The following is a general status report for the Basic Grant Program for the 1974-75 academic year. Part I is concerned with the summary of applicant information. Part II will deal with institutional reported information.

Part I is a general analysis of the characteristics and distribution of the applicant population. The tables are categorized to show statistics for (1) Total Application Population, (2) Dependent Applicants, and (3) Independent Applicants in terms of their family income distribution and their eligibility determinations, and (4) a comparative analysis of the distribution of applicants for 1973-74 and 1974-75.

Table Series I – Summary Statistics 1973-74/1974-75

In the review of the 1974-75 operations it may be helpful to highlight the major program trends in comparison with 1973-74 results. As indicated in Table I, the qualification rate for the total applicant population increased from 55.7% in 1973-74 to 61.2% in 1974-75. Further, during the 1974-75 academic year, a larger proportion of applicants receiving social security educational benefits qualified for awards, i.e., 29.7% in 1973-74 compared to 49.7% in 1974-75. Similarly, the qualification rate of applicants receiving veterans educational benefits increased significantly. A slight increase in the qualification rate of applicants reporting farm and business assets is also to be noted. Although the qualification rates for recipients of social security and veterans educational benefits and for applicants reporting farm and business assets have increased over the previous year, it should further be noted that the proportionate share which these applicants constitute of the total population has remained relatively constant over both program years. However, a notable shirft in the distribution of dependent and independent applicants has occurred. Specifically, independent applicants constituted 12.3% of all applicants during the 1973-74 academic year as compared to 19.5% during the 1974-75 academic year.

Of particular interest may be the change in the proportionate distribution between dependent and independent applicants. As can be seen from Table I-A which shows the distribution of qualified applicants by income level for 1973-74 and 1974-75, independent qualified applicants constituted 13.3% of all qualified applicants during 1973-74 as compared to 21.9% during 1974-75. More importantly, however, is the fact that qualified independent applicants are concentrated in the \$0-2,999 income range, i.e., 8.6% in 1973-74 as compared to 13.2% in 1974-75. Primarily as a result of the increase in the independent applicants during the 1974-75 academic year ad in view of the low-income characteristics of these student, the combined percentage of all eligible applicants falling the 40-2,999 income category has also increased from 25.6% in 1973-74 to 28.3% in 1974-75.

Table I-A also indicates an increase in the number of eligible dependent applicants in the \$12,000+ income category, i.e., 7.6% in 1973-74 as compared to 8.8% in 1974-75. The increase in the proportionate number of eligible applicants appears to be due to both the modifications in the Family contribution Schedules and a higher applicant rate in the \$12,000+ income category.

The applicant rate is illustrated in Table I-B which shows the total number of applicants by income category for 1973-74 and 1974-75. Specifically, the percentage of applications received from persons reporting income of \$12,000 or more has increased from 28.4 in 1973-74 to 30.2% in 1974-75. When only considering dependent applicants, persons reporting \$12,000+ incased from 31.7% in 1973-74 to 36.4% in 1974-75.

Another way of illustrating program trends, particularly in relation to the impact of Schedule changes, is a comparison of the distribution of qualifying applicants by index level for both years. In this context, Table I-C shows the distribution by index level of eligible dependent and independent applicants for 1973-74 and 1974-75. This table shows that the proportion of both dependent and independent applicants with an eligibility index of 200 or less has significantly increase form 1973-74 to 19740-75. In addition, this table also shows a corresponding proportionate decrease of applicants with eligibility indices of 200 or more between the 1973-74 and 1974-75 academic years. Assuming that award levels would not change between years and the further liberalizations of the Family contribution Schedules are mad each year, this trend implies a gradual reduction in the average amount of the Expected Family contribution, with the result of increase average award levels.

Table Series II - Applicants by Eligibility Status and Income Range

This series of tables provide a breakdown of the total applicant population, qualifying and non-qualifying by income range with percentage distribution.

Table II-A indicates that 555.2% (376,096) of all qualify applicants had incomes below \$6,000, and 44.8% (305,552) of all qualifying applicants had incomes of \$6,000 and above. Of the total non-qualifying applicants, 11.7% (50,455) had incomes below \$6,000 and 88.3% (381,981) had incomes of \$6,000 and above.

Table II-B indicates that 45.4% (242,034) of qualifying <u>dependent</u> applicants had income below \$6,000 and 54.6% (290,671) had incomes of \$6,000 and above. Of the total non-qualify dependent applicants 5.1% (18,490) had incomes below \$6,000 and 94.9% (345,171) incomes of \$6,000 and above.

Table II-C indicates that 90.0% (134,112) of all qualifying <u>independent</u> applicants had incomes below \$6,000, and 10.0% (14,881) had incomes of \$6,000 and above. Of the total non-qualifying independent applicants, 46.5% (31,965) had incomes below \$6,000, and 53.5% (36,810) had incomes of \$6,000 and above.

Table Series III - Eligibility Index Level by Family Income

This series of tables provide a breakdown of all qualified applicants by income range and level of eligibility. Qualifying applicants with indices of 600 and below received awards ranging from \$226 to \$1,050. Those qualifying with indices of 600 and above received awards ranging from \$50 to \$2504.

Table III-A indicates that 74.8% (599,995) of <u>all</u> qualifying applicants had eligibility indices of 600 or below. Of these qualified applicants with indices of 600 or below, 68.4% (349,.39) had incomes below \$6,000. This table also shows that 25.2% (171,653) of all qualifying applicants had indices of 601 and above. Of all qualifying applicants with indices of 601 and above, 15.8% (27,057) had incomes below \$6,000.

Table III-B indicates that 72.3% (385,317) of qualified dependent applicants had eligibility indices of 600 or below. Of these qualified dependent applicants with indices of 600 or below, 59.9% (203,807) had incomes below \$6,000. This table also shows that 27.7% (147,388) of qualified dependent applicants had indices of 601 and above. Of these qualified dependent applicants with indices of 601 and above, 7.4% (10,867) had income below \$6,000.

Table III-C indicates that 83.7% (127,678) of the qualified independent applicants had an eligibility indices of 600 or below. Of these qualified independent applicants with indices of 600 or below, 94.5% (117,872) had income below \$6,000. This table also shows that 16.3% (24,265) of the qualified independent applicants had indices of 601 or above. Of these qualified independent applicants with indices of 601 or above, 66.7% (16,190) had incomes below \$6,000.

Table IV - Applicants with Social Security Educational Benefits

This table provides an analysis of the total number of applicants receiving social security educational benefits, those qualify and not qualifying, by income range with percentage distribution. Specifically, 85.5% (49,184) of all qualifying applicants receiving social security educational benefits had incomes below \$6,000 and 14.5% (8,334) had incomes of \$6,000 and above. Of the total non-qualifying applicants receiving social security educational benefits, 32.9% (19,145) had incomes below \$6,000 and 67.1% (39,128) had incomes of \$6,000 and above.

Table V - Applicants with Veterans Educational Benefits

This table provides an analysis of the total number of applicants receiving veterans educational benefits, those qualifying and not qualifying, by income range with percentage distribution. Specifically, 87.5% (20,356) of the qualifying applicants receiving veterans educational benefits had incomes below \$6,000 and 12.5% (2,902) had incomes of \$6,000 and above. Of the total non-qualifying applicants receiving veterans educational benefits, 39.6% (14,432) had incomes below \$6,000 and 60.4% (22,046) had incomes of \$6,000 and above.

Table Series VI - Applicants by State

Tables VI-A, B, and C provides a distribution of applicants by state for Total Applicants, Dependent Applicants, and Independent Applicants, total qualifying and total non-qualifying. This data reflects the current mailing address of the applicant and is not necessarily where he is attending school. As such, the state distribution of applicants may not reflect the legal residence of the students.

Table VII - Payment Schedule (1974-75)

The amount of a student's award is based on the students' eligibility index, the cost of attendance at his/her school, and available appropriations for that academic year. This award information is indicated on a payment schedule which is issued annually to all eligible educational institutions by the U.S. Office of Education. Table VII is a copy of the payment schedule which was in effect during the 1974-75 academic year.

BASIC EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY GRANT PROGRAM PAYMENT SCHEDULE FOR ACADEMIC YEAR 1974-75

The payment schedule is to be used in the calculation of awards for the Basic Educational Opportunity Grant Program for the 1974-75 academic year and will be in effect until June 30, 1975. It indicates the amount of a student's award based on a given expected family contribution and cost of attendance.

To use the payment schedule, take that amount of the student's family contribution (from the "Family Contribution Analysis Report" provided by the student) and the total allowable costs of attendance (according to the Basic Grant Regulations, Section 190.51) for the full academic year for that student. The various ranges for family contribution appear across the top of the table and appropriate ranges of total student costs appear along the left-hand side of the table. By locating the student in each proper range, the amount of the student's award for the full academic year can be determined.

In developing the payment schedule, the appropriate reduction language specified in the legislation has already been taken into account. There are certain cases, though, where the award from the payment schedule will not be the amount that should be disbursed to a student. For example, when a student has enrolled for only one term, his award must be reduced to reflect that reduced period of attendance. For a complete discussion of such cases, see the Program Notes: Calculation of the Amount of a Student's Basic Educational Opportunity Grant.
