Nebraska FFY 2012 Compliance Data Summary Notes

INDICATOR 4B: The State its definition of “significant discrepancy.”

The State reported that one district was identified as having a significant discrepancy, by race or ethnicity, in the rate of suspensions and expulsions of greater than ten days in a school year for children with IEPs. The State reported that it reviewed the district’s policies, procedures, and practices relating to the development and implementation of IEPs, the use of positive behavioral interventions and supports, and procedural safeguards to ensure compliance with the IDEA, as required by 34 CFR §300.170(b) for the district identified with significant discrepancy in FFY 2011. The State also reported that no districts were identified as having policies, procedures or practices that contribute to the significant discrepancy and do not comply with requirements relating to the development and implementation of IEPs, the use of positive behavioral interventions and supports, and procedural safeguards.

The State reported that 32 of 249 districts did not meet the State-established minimum “n” size requirement of 30 enrolled students with disabilities with a minimum cell size of six.

INDICATOR 9: The State reported that no districts were identified with disproportionate representation of racial and ethnic groups in special education and related services.

The State provided its definition of “disproportionate representation.”

The State reported that 221 of 249 districts did not meet the State-established minimum “n” size requirement of 30 or more students in the group of interest and were excluded from the calculation.

The State provided its definition of “disproportionate representation.”
