Dear Dr. Currier:

Thank you for the timely submission of Mississippi's Federal fiscal year (FFY) 2009 Annual Performance Report (APR) and revised State Performance Plan (SPP) under Part C of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).

The Department has determined that, under IDEA sections 616(d)(2)(A)(iii) and 642, Mississippi needs intervention in implementing the requirements of Part C of IDEA. The Department's determination is based on the totality of the State's data and information including the State's FFY 2009 APR and revised SPP (including targets and improvement activities for each year through FFY 2012), other State-reported data, and the State's submissions under the Special Conditions on the State's FFY 2010 IDEA grant, and other publicly available information. See the enclosure entitled "How the Department Made Determinations under Sections 616(d) and 642 of the IDEA in 2011: Part C" for further details.

The specific factor affecting the determination by the Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP) of needs intervention for Mississippi was that Mississippi has been subject to Departmental enforcement for multiple years for failing to comply with a key IDEA requirement, the noncompliance in this area is longstanding, and the State's data reported under its FFY 2010 special conditions demonstrate continued noncompliance. The requirement is to ensure the timely provision of early intervention services to infants and toddlers with disabilities and their families, as required by 34 CFR §§303.340(c), 303.342(e) and 303.344(f)(1).

OSEP considered the length of time and magnitude of Mississippi's failure to meet the timely service provision requirements. OSEP has imposed special conditions on Mississippi's Part C grant award since FFY 2006 due to the State's failure to ensure the timely provision of services. In its May 2, 2011 progress report, the State submitted data for the period January 1, 2011 through April 15, 2011, indicating 79% compliance with the timely service provision requirements for nine health districts. The State's FFY 2009 APR data for timely service provision reflect 76% compliance. For this reason, OSEP has determined that Mississippi needs intervention in implementing the requirements of Part C of the IDEA. We hope that Mississippi will be able to meet requirements with its FFY 2010 APR.

The enclosed table provides OSEP's analysis of the State's FFY 2009 APR and revised SPP and identifies, by indicator, OSEP's review of any revisions made by the State to its targets, improvement activities (timelines and resources) and baseline data in the State's SPP. The table also identifies, by indicator: (1) the State's reported FFY 2009 data; (2) whether such data met the State's FFY 2009 targets and reflect progress or slippage from the prior year's data; (3) if

applicable, that the State's data are not valid and reliable; and (4) whether the State corrected findings of noncompliance.


Your State may want to consider taking advantage of available sources of technical assistance. As you know, pursuant to IDEA sections 616(b)(2)(C)(ii)(1) and 642, your State must report annually to the public on the performance of each early intervention services program (EIS program) located in the State on the targets in the SPP. In addition, your State must: (1) review EIS program performance against targets in the State's SPP; (2) determine if each EIS program "meets requirements" of IDEA Part C, or "needs assistance," "needs intervention," or "needs substantial intervention" in implementing Part C of the IDEA; (3) take appropriate enforcement action; and (4) inform each EIS program of its determination. Finally, please ensure that your updated SPP is posted on the State lead agency's Web site and made available to the public, consistent with IDEA sections 616(b)(2)(C)(ii)(1) and 642.

Pursuant to sections 616(d)(2)(B) and 642 of the IDEA, a State that is determined to need intervention or need substantial intervention, and does not agree with this determination, may request an opportunity to meet with the Assistant Secretary to demonstrate why the Department should change the State's determination. To request a hearing, submit a letter to Dr. Alexa Posny, Assistant Secretary, United States Department of Education, 400 Maryland Avenue SW, Washington, DC 20202 within 15 days of the date of this letter. The letter must include the basis for your request for a change in the State's determination.

OSEP is committed to supporting Mississippi's efforts to improve results for infants and toddlers with disabilities and their families and looks forward to working with your State over the next year.
