Dear Secretary Cansler:

Thank you for the timely submission of North Carolina's Federal fiscal year (FFY) 2009 Annual Performance Report (APR) and revised State Performance Plan (SPP) under Part C of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).

The Department has determined that, under IDEA sections 616(d) and 642, North Carolina needs assistance in meeting the requirements of Part C of IDEA. The Department's determination is based on the totality of the State's data and information including the State's FFY 2009 APR and revised SPP (including targets and improvement activities for each year through FFY 2012), other State-reported data, and other publicly available information. See the enclosure entitled "How the Department Made Determinations under Sections 616(d) and 642 of the IDEA in 2011: Part C" for further details.

The specific factor affecting the Office of Special Education Programs' (OSEP's) determination of needs assistance for North Carolina was that North Carolina's FFY 2009 data for Indicator 9, which measures the timely correction of findings of noncompliance, reflect 88% compliance. For that reason, we are unable to determine that North Carolina met requirements for FFY 2009 under IDEA sections 616(d) and 642.

OSEP notes other areas that reflect a high level of performance, which include that North Carolina reported valid and reliable data for all indicators and a high level of compliance for Indicators 1 (95.98%), 8A (99.82%), 8B (99.47%), 8C (97.24%), and 14 (100%). We hope that North Carolina will be able to demonstrate that it meets requirements with its FFY 2010 APR.

The enclosed table provides OSEP's analysis of the State's FFY 2009 APR and revised SPP and identifies, by indicator, OSEP's review of any revisions made by the State to its targets, improvement activities (timelines and resources) and baseline data in the State's SPP. The table also identifies, by indicator: (1) the State's reported FFY 2009 data; (2) whether such data met the State's FFY 2009 targets and reflect progress or slippage from the prior year's data; (3) if applicable, that the State's data are not valid and reliable; and (4) whether the State corrected findings of noncompliance.

Your State may want to consider taking advantage of available sources of technical assistance. As you know, pursuant to IDEA sections 616(b)(2)(C)(ii)(I) and 642, your State must report annually to the public on the performance of each early intervention services program (EIS



program) located in the State on the targets in the SPP. In addition, your State must: (1) review EIS program performance against targets in the State's SPP; (2) determine if each EIS program "meets requirements" of IDEA Part C, or "needs assistance," "needs intervention," or "needs substantial intervention" in implementing Part C of the IDEA; (3) take appropriate enforcement actions; and (4) inform each EIS program of its determination. Finally, please ensure that your updated SPP is posted on the State lead agency's Web site and made available to the public, consistent with IDEA sections 616(b)(2)(C)(ii)(1) and 642.
