## Leading Indicators

### What was the average cohort graduation rate in Cohort 1 SIG schools in 2010-11, by locale?

Sixty-two percent of students in the 2010-11 cohort in SIG high schools (with submitted graduation rates) graduated on time. Graduation rates were highest for students in towns and rural areas and lowest for those in urban areas.

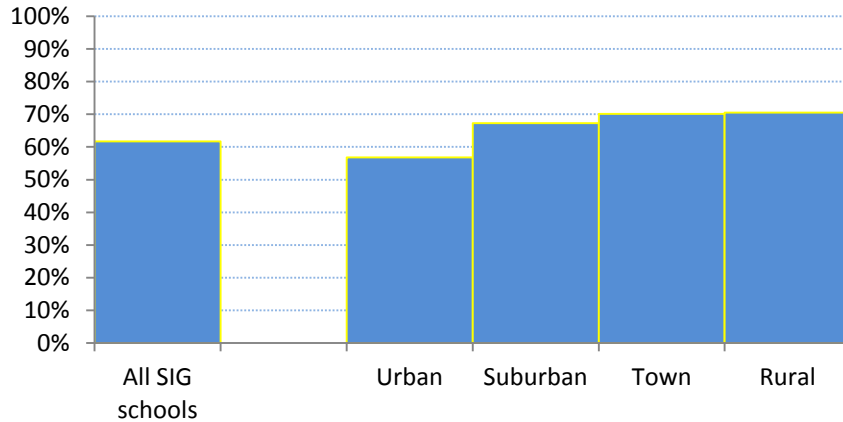

### What was the average advanced course-taking rate in Cohort 1 SIG schools in 2010-11, by locale?

Approximately 18 percent of 9<sup>th</sup> through 12<sup>th</sup> grade students in SIG schools (with submitted course-taking rates) were enrolled in an advanced or college course in 2010-11. Advanced coursetaking rates did not vary substantially by locale.

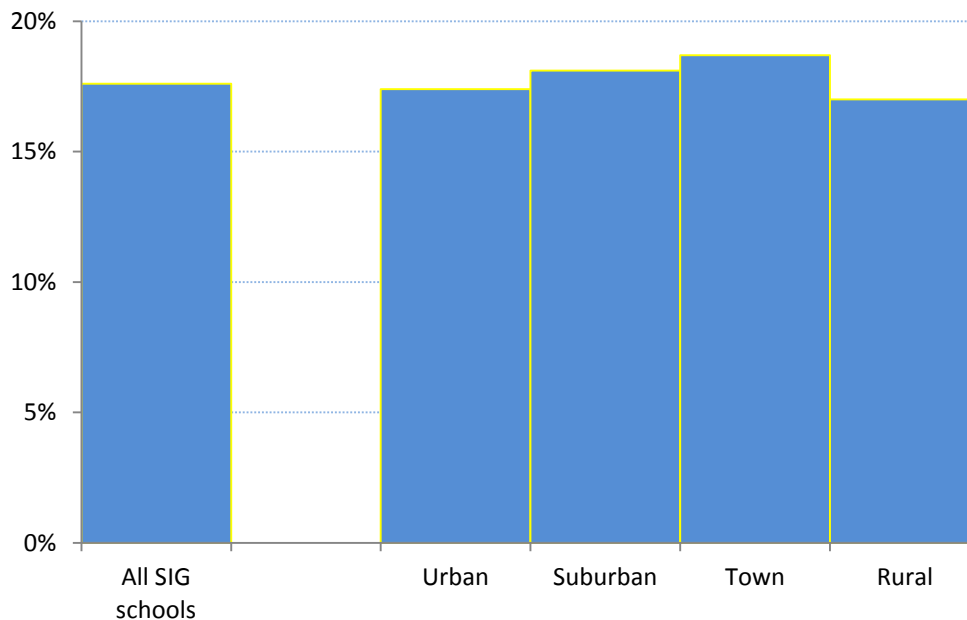

More specifically, Delaware, New York, Wyoming, and the Bureau of Indian Education have cohort 1 SIG schools with 9<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup>, or 12<sup>th</sup> grade but are not represented in this table. Other states have data for some, but not all, cohort 1 SIG schools. Missing data rates varied substantially by locale. The mean for urban schools, in particular, is more likely to be an inaccurate representation of all urban SIG schools.

### What was the average student attendance rate in Cohort 1 SIG schools in 2010-11, by level and locale?

On average, students in SIG schools (with submitted attendance rates) attended approximately 90% of school days in 2010-11. Attendance rates were lowest for high school students and those in urban schools.

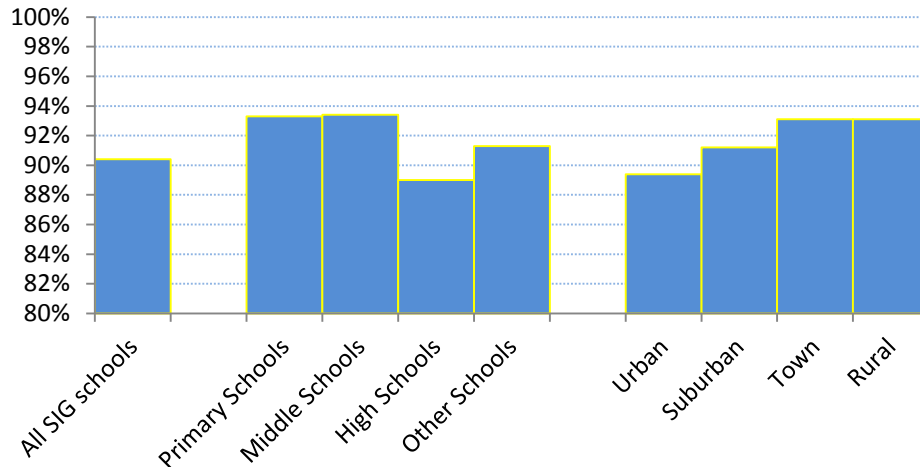

### What was the average teacher attendance rate in Cohort 1 SIG schools in 2010-11, by level and locale?

On average, SIG teachers (in schools submitting teacher attendance data) attended 94% of school days in 2010-11. Teacher attendance rates did not vary substantially by level or locale.

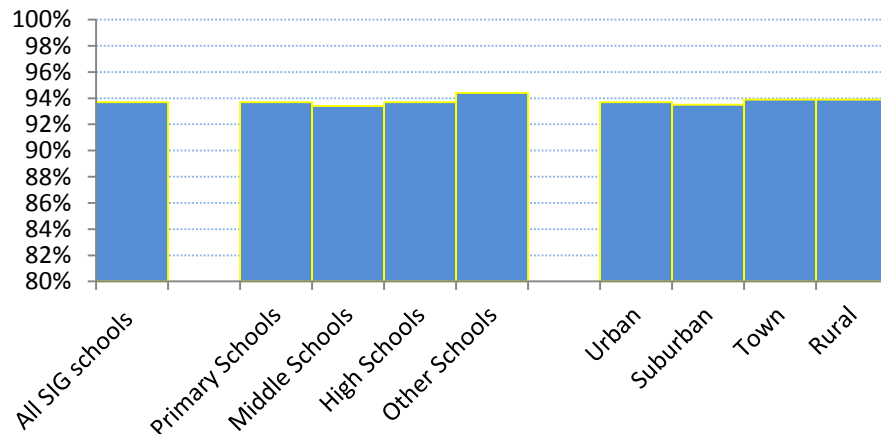

Other states have data for some, but not all, cohort 1 SIG schools. The mean for “other” schools, in particular, is more likely to be an inaccurate representation of cohort 1 schools in this category.

### What was the average school year length in Cohort 1 SIG schools in 2010-11, by level and locale?

On average, students in SIG schools (with submitted school year minutes data) spent just under 75,000 minutes, or approximately 1,250 hours in school. Students in high schools/other schools and towns tended to spend the most time in school.
