#### IV. Tax Increases Averted

Estimate the degree to which State tax increases were averted because of the availability of SFSF funds.

Entry from previous timeframe:

**Over the period FY 2009 through FY 2011, Maryland reduced planned spending by about \$4.8 billion. If State Fiscal Stabilization Funds had not been available to support education and essential government services during this period, additional spending reductions would have been implemented. Rather than fund planned investments in K-12 education, Maryland would have capped the growth in spending or level funded services. The State would also have been unable to freeze tuition for Morgan State University and University System of Maryland in FY 2009 and 2010 and cap tuition growth at 3% in FY 2011. Deeper reductions in the size of the State workforce through layoffs and attrition would also have resulted.**

#### VI. Progress in Advancing Education Reform

**A. Reducing inequities in the distribution of highly qualified teachers:**

Describe the steps that the State has taken, from October 1, 2010 through September 30, 2011, to reduce inequities in the distribution of highly qualified teachers.

Entry from previous timeframe:

**Maryland is employing multiple strategies to reduce inequities in the distribution of highly qualified teachers, including:**

- Maryland local school systems are required to submit Master Plans to the State. In those plans, school systems are required to address the equity issues by reporting data on retention and recruitment and explaining their strategies to improve the equitable distribution of teachers.
- Title IIA funds are offered for class size reduction and the hiring of more highly qualified teachers to provide additional support for students and teachers in challenging schools.
- Maryland held a state recruitment fair in Baltimore City to encourage diversity in our teaching force and enhance the recruitment of teachers for challenging schools.
- Maryland's Race To the Top application outlines a tiered approach to certification for public school teachers wherein evaluation forms the basis for professional development, retention, and incentives.
- Currently RFPs for Race To The Top projects reflect the need to prepare principals and teachers for success in urban and rural settings, and an emphasis on preparation in STEM content for elementary and secondary teachers.
- The Reconfiguration of Current Certification Structure Work Group has been meeting to revise regulations to ensure that every school is staffed with effective teachers. Further, the state has complied with all requirements of Phase 2 State Fiscal Stabilization Funds, Achieving Equity in Teacher and Principal Distribution by:

- Collecting descriptions of all 24 LSS evaluation systems for both teachers and principals
- Collecting teacher performance data at the district level
- Collecting principal performance at the district level
- Developing a plan to collect by June 30, 2011, teacher performance data by school
- Requiring all 24 LSS to report this information publicly on their individual school system web sites.

Please update for the new timeframe:

**Maryland is employing multiple strategies to reduce inequities in the distribution of highly qualified teachers, including:**

- Maryland local school systems are required to submit annual updates of their Master Plans to the State. In those plans, school systems are required to address the equity issues by reporting data on retention and recruitment and explaining their strategies to improve the equitable distribution of teachers. MSDE provides technical assistance to school systems that are not meeting expectations that focus on staffing strategies, certification issues and conducts desk audits to assure teachers are certified for the grade or content they teach.
- Title II, Part A Grant funds are offered for the hiring of more qualified teachers for class size reduction, particularly in the early grades.
- Maryland holds an annual state recruitment fair in Baltimore City to encourage diversity in our teaching force and enhance the recruitment of teachers for challenging schools. All 24 school systems and MSDE are sponsors of this event. This year over 1,500 teacher candidates attended.
- Maryland's Race to the Top (RTTT) application outlines a tiered approach to certification for public school teachers and others who wish to be credentialed, wherein teacher evaluation will form the basis for professional development, retention, and incentives. Maryland's Professional Standards Teacher Board has made significant progress in this effort and will make recommendations to the State Board of Education in the near future.
- Two RTTT projects reflect the need to prepare teachers and principals for success in urban and rural settings. Several Universities are developing skills, dispositions and content to assure that teachers can hit the ground running in challenging schools in the Teach MD project. New Leaders for New Schools (NLNS) is working with Baltimore City and Prince Georges County to place more effective principals in hard to staff schools. In addition, NLNS is working for the first time with five eastern shore counties and Salisbury University and University of Maryland Eastern Shore to infuse the skills, dispositions and content needed for principals to be successful in challenging schools.
- Two RTTT projects focus on preparation in STEM content for elementary and secondary teachers. U Teach will be implemented at Towson University, the largest teacher preparation school in the state, to recruit science and math

teachers from these majors in freshman year in order to double the number of STEM teachers. Several universities and colleges are changing their elementary programs to focus on STEM and others are preparing a STEM endorsement program for teachers already in the classroom. These two efforts should build capacity in elementary schools so that there are more students in the STEM pipeline. • An MSDE sponsored workgroup made up of stakeholders including LEAs, teacher's union membership and others met this past school year to identify models of differentiated performance compensation to encourage effective teachers and principals to work in challenging settings. These suggestions and models will be submitted to the State Board of Education in the near future for their review and will later be provided to local superintendents should they consider a differentiated performance compensation model. Further, the state has complied with all requirements of Phase 2 State Fiscal Stabilization Funds, Achieving Equity in Teacher and Principal Distribution by: • Collecting descriptions of all 24 LEA evaluation systems for both teachers and principals • Collecting teacher performance data at the district level and school level • Collecting principal performance at the district level • Requiring all 24 LEAs to annually update their individual school system web sites to provide current information on teacher and principal performance.
