**Education Stabilization funding allocated to the State's IHEs will be used used to fund top educational priorities for which a shortfall exists, as well as for renovation, modernization and repair of facilities dedicated for instruction and research, and supplemental funding for instructor salaries in the State's seven community colleges. Use of these funds commenced with the school year beginning September 1, 2010.**

Please update for the new timeframe:

**Phase 1 of the State Fiscal Stabilization Fund-Education Grant program, as amended, allocates stabilization funds to the University of Wyoming and the state's seven community colleges. Specifically, funding will be used by IHEs for education and general expenditures, in such a way as to mitigate the need to raise tuition and fees, and for modernization, renovation or repair of facilities primarily used for instruction or research. Phase I award date was 7/09/2009. Wyoming's amended Phase II application, signed 6/30/2010, reduced the amount designated for educational purposes from \$67,620,197 to \$57,568,071. The remaining balance of the Education Grant funding, \$10,052,126, will not be allocated by the Governor. Entry from previous timeframe:

**The State dedicated the entire allocation from the Government Services funds toward public safety. In particular, the State addressed a longstanding issue relating to the detention of juveniles who are often held in adult jails or other inadequate, unsafe facilities. The State has provided funding for construction, expansion and renovation of juvenile detention facilities across the state. A portion of the funding, approximately 2%, is allocated to a single state agency for the general management and project oversight during the construction of the facilities.**

Please update for the new timeframe:

**The State dedicated 91% of the the Government Services Fund Grant toward public safety. In particular, the State addressed a longstanding issue relating to the detention of juveniles who are often held in adult jails or other inadequate, unsafe facilities. The State provided funding for construction, expansion and/or renovation of five regional juvenile detention facilities. Additional funding, 1%, was set aside to provide project management services to all applicants though the State's Construction Management Division. The balance of the funding, 8%, was allocated to the Wyoming Alliance of Boys and Girls Clubs. This funding provided facility upgrades in the form of major maintenance, as well as assisted in attaining the entity's goal of "lowering student drop out rates across the state" with funding for educational equipment and materials to be used in their "Latch Key Kids Program". **In the 2010-2011 school year, 98.5% of classes in Wyoming schools were taught by highly qualified teachers, an improvement of .9% over the preceding school year. The annual Highly Qualified Teacher analysis includes a statewide analysis of the distribution of those teachers. Highly qualified teachers were equitably distributed at both the elementary and secondary levels and among students of poverty, minority students, and all other students during the 2010-2011 school year. The Wyoming Department of Education (WDE) continues to support the equitable distribution of highly qualified teachers in all schools. Districts are annually provided training and templates for analysis of the equitable distribution of highly qualified teachers. Included in that technical assistance is guidance for addressing inequitable distribution when analysis reveals that condition. Every district is required to annually analyze the equitable distribution of highly qualified teachers among like grade band schools. Equitable distribution is monitored on site as a component of Title II-A monitoring. WDE is committed to the equitable distribution of highly qualified teachers, and will continue to**

**support that commitment with technical assistance and monitoring for all districts.**
