

Uses of the Government Services Fund- Description of "Other"

Broadband – \$5,579,365

The Government Services Fund appropriation is being used for mapping and planning projects, the administrative support necessary to participate in the federal programs, and to match funding for broadband grants received from the federal agencies.

The ARRA provides \$7.2 billion in funding for broadband and related programs through the NTIA and the USDA RUS. The state received Round 1 funding for mapping and planning activities from the NTIA in November 2009. In addition, on July 1, 2010 the state submitted a supplemental funding application for additional mapping and planning activities to the NTIA. The supplemental grant application is currently under review by the NTIA. The federal agencies are now reviewing broadband applications filed in late March 2010 for Round 2 funding in accordance with the Notice of Funds Availability published in January 2010 that provided guidance on the rules and program requirements. The **MOBroadbandNow** initiative was created specifically to coordinate the state's efforts to obtain broadband funding from the NTIA and RUS. The state conducted an extensive outreach and review process to identify business partners. The state and its partners worked diligently to prepare a comprehensive multi-partner proposal for both the middle-mile and last-mile that maximizes coverage and minimizes duplication and cost. The **MOBroadbandNow** proposal will bring direct high capacity connections to 2,357 anchor institutions throughout the state, including 555 K-12 schools, 444 medical and health providers, more than 400 public safety entities, and 754 other community support organizations and government facilities. The **MOBroadbandNow** proposal will build more than 2,400 miles of middle-mile fiber and an additional 315 miles of last-mile fiber all across the state. In these economically distressed times, the **MOBroadbandNow** proposal will provide almost 1,800 direct jobs. Many Missouri residents and businesses have little hope of realizing the benefits of competitive high-speed broadband in the near future without approval of grants from the federal agencies.

Healthcare Information Technology - \$1,629,600

The Government Services Fund appropriation is being used to match the ARRA Health Information Technology (HI-TECH) funding. The HITECH Act requires a match to federal monies awarded to states beginning in fiscal year 2011. The matching funds will be used to meet the requirements of the Department of Health and Human Services, Office of the National Coordinator of Health Information Technology, the agency charged with overseeing the HITECH funds and the development of states' electronic health record systems.

The ARRA, Title XIII, Health Information Technology (HI-TECH), Section 3013 "State Grants to Promote Health Information Technology", established grants for states to conduct activities to facilitate and expand the electronic movement and use of health information among organizations according to nationally recognized standards. The Missouri Department of Social Services was awarded \$13,765,040 to plan for and implement a statewide health information exchange. The exchange will provide the technical infrastructure for health care providers, hospitals, and other appropriate entities to share patients' health records. The Department will contract with a multi-stakeholder organization – the Statewide Health Information Organization (HIO) to govern and operate the exchange. The Statewide HIO will be a new, not-for-profit organization overseen by a diverse Board of Directors.
