State's Primary Education Funding Formulae

Additional Submission Requirement: In an attachment to the application, identify and describe each of the State's primary elementary and secondary education funding formulae that were used in determining the calculations provided above for the levels of State support for elementary and secondary education.

Primary funding is a composite of three aid programs, all of which are the result of HB539 and HB530 enacted during the 2008 legislative session. The bills became law in June and July of 2008 with effective dates of July 1, 2009 (FY10). The three programs are:

Adequate Education Grants: This program is a statutory entitlement based on enrollment in regular school districts and the cost of adequacy. The cost of adequacy varies based on the percentage of students in a school eligible for free/reduced price lunch. There are additional allocations for special education and limited English proficient students, and for communities with a low property tax base. (RSA 198:38-48)

Kindergarten Adequacy: Prior to September 2009 districts were not required to provide kindergarten. Since there is a three year lag in the data used for Adequate Education Grants, Kindergarten Aid is a district entitlement for the first three years after kindergarten is instituted. Beginning with FY10 the rate will be tied to the Adequacy rate. (RSA 198:48-b)

Charter School Tuition: The first charter school opened in 2004. Prior to FY08 school districts covered tuition for their resident students attending charter schools. The State now pays tuition directly to charter schools. The rate is tied to the Adequacy rate. (RSA 194-B:11)

The State makes a single appropriation to the University System and a single appropriation to the Community College System (notwithstanding multiple lines in the budget documents). State Fiscal Stabilization Funds will be used to bring each appropriation up to the FY09 level. The FY09 appropriations are documented in Attachment A-7. For the NH Community College System, the General Fund appropriation was \$34,625,817 (page 544), less Christa McAuliffe Planetarium, General Fund \$614,926 (page 543) plus the warrant for FY09 salary increases \$3,436,327, for a balance of \$37,447,218. For the University System the General Fund appropriation was \$100,000,000 (page 548).





