

Since the original application, Fiscal Year 2009 has ended and the Controller's Office has released the preliminary (unaudited) closing figures for FY 2009. In addition, in June 2009 the General Assembly passed a FY 2010 budget, which takes the place of the Governor's proposed budget figures that were included in the May application.
