

- Confirmation that the initial baseline data identified in Appendix B of the application is acceptable for purposes of demonstrating the State's current status in each of the four education reform areas for which the State provides assurances, or submission of alternative initial baseline data. *(Part 3 of the Application)*

 - (1) An assurance that the State will comply with the Stabilization program MOE requirements;







The preliminary data reflecting the number of schools in improvement, corrective action, and restructuring presented on the State Fiscal Stabilization Fund webpage (<http://www.ed.gov/programs/statestabilization/schooldata.pdf>) includes an error for Tennessee. In the preliminary data, eight schools were classified as State/LEA Reconstitution Plan and appeared in the "0-No Classification" category. These schools have been reclassified to the "Restructuring (Implementation)" category in conformance with USED school improvement reporting categories. The correct data appear in the table below:

In determining the amount of State funding for fiscal year 2006, the actual expenditures made by the State to elementary and secondary education through the Basic Education Program (BEP) formula were used. This information was obtained from the State of Tennessee Statewide Accounting and Reporting System, Spending/Receipt Plan YTD Status Report, Accounting Date 06/30/06.

In determining the amount of funding for fiscal year 2009, the projected expenditures budgeted by the State for the BEP formula were used. This information was obtained from the State of Tennessee Statewide Accounting and Reporting System, Appropriation File. Funding for the BEP formula is located in allotment code 331.25 BEP and Other LEA Support. Also located in this allotment code is funding for Safe Schools. Funding for Safe Schools was excluded from the calculations.

In determining the amount of funding for fiscal year 2010, the projected expenditures budgeted by the State for the BEP formula were used. This information was obtained

from the State of Tennessee Budget Analysis System. Funding for Safe Schools was excluded from the calculations.

(b) Identify and describe the data sources used in determining the levels of State support for public IHEs.

Tennessee's higher education structure consists of two governing boards – the University of Tennessee (UT) and the Tennessee Board of Regents (TBR) – that are coordinated through the Tennessee Higher Education Commission (THEC). All higher education institutions belong to one of these two governing boards. Title 49, Chapters 8 and 9 of the Tennessee Code establish TBR and UT respectively, which outlines responsibilities, structure and composition of each board. In addition, two other agencies participate in Tennessee's public higher education enterprise – the Tennessee Student Assistance Corporation (TSAC) which coordinates student financial aid programs and the Tennessee Foreign Language Institute (TFLI) which provides foreign language instruction.

Tennessee determined, for the purposes of calculating Maintenance-of-Effort baseline data and fiscal stabilization state support restoration amounts, its public institutions of higher education include every program belonging to the two higher education systems, except for the administrative offices for each system and the UT Research Initiatives program. Also included in the calculations are any appropriations made to THEC that are then distributed to UT or TBR for programs that directly support instruction and related education and general activities. In Tennessee this would include both the Centers of Excellence and Emphasis, which support institutionally distinctive disciplinary areas. State support in 2005-06 included funds for the Geier Desegregation Settlement, a 1968 lawsuit that was dismissed in September of 2006. Funding for that program is now included in the Access and Diversity Initiatives in each system and provides support for a wide array of institutional activities to increase diversity. These activities include student and faculty recruitment and new program development.

The above definition is consistent with guidance, specific to Tennessee, received during a telephone conversation Tennessee Division of Budget staff members had with staff members of the U.S. Department of Education on April 14, 2009.

In determining the amount of State funding for fiscal year 2006, the actual expenditures made by the State to public institutions of higher education were used. This information was obtained from the State of Tennessee Statewide Accounting and Reporting System, Schedule of Current Year Allotments and Expenditures, Accounting Date 06/30/06.

In determining the amount of funding for fiscal year 2009, the projected expenditures budgeted by the State for public institutions of higher education were used. This information was obtained from the State of Tennessee Statewide Accounting and Reporting System, Appropriation File.

In determining the amount of funding for fiscal year 2010, the projected expenditures budgeted by the State for public institutions of higher education were used. This information was obtained from the State of Tennessee Budget Analysis System.

All amounts exclude expenditures from tuition and fees, for capital projects, and for research and development.

The Basic Education Program (BEP) is the primary funding formula through which state education dollars are generated and distributed to Tennessee local education agencies. It is administered pursuant to the provisions of the Education Improvement Act (Public Chapter 535 of the Tennessee Public Acts of 1992) and Public Chapter 369 of the Tennessee Public Acts of 2007.

The most recent enactment of BEP formula changes went into effect July 1, 2008 under the State of Tennessee Public Acts of 2008, Chapter 1203, Section 11, Item 1.

The Tennessee Basic Education Program, BEP 2.0, 2008-09 Blue Book (<http://tennessee.gov/sbe/BEP/BEP%20Booklet%20FY09%20FINAL.pdf>) details the formula component levels used in the formula for FY 2009 and FY 2010.

In determining the amount of State funding for fiscal year 2008, the actual expenditures made by the State to elementary and secondary education through the Basic Education Program (BEP) formula were used. This information was obtained from the State of Tennessee Statewide Accounting and Reporting System, Spending/Receipt Plan YTD Status Report, Accounting Date 06/30/08.

Other data sources are the same as those provided under Maintenance-of-Effort Baseline Data.

FY 2009: Restore each institution to its FY 2009 Work Program amount (before allotment reserves were set aside.) From the remaining funds, each institution will receive an equal proportion of the funds relative to fiscal year 2008 recurring appropriations.

FY 2010: Restore each institution to its FY 2010 level before base reductions were implemented. From the remaining funds, each institution will receive an equal proportion of the funds relative to fiscal year 2008 recurring appropriations.

FY 2011: will be distributed in the same manner as FY 2010.
